

**2013 Georg Breuer Rudesheimer Berg
Schlossberg Riesling Trocken**

Theresa Breuer's 9th vintage of the Rudesheimer Berg Schlossberg Riesling trocken since the early death of her father Bernhard appears straw yellow and offers an amazingly clear, fresh, deep and dusty-mineral aroma of lime chutney along with pure rocky flavors. The impressive precision and density on the nose leads to a pure, full-bodied, penetrating mineral though elegant and piquant wine that is as clear as a bell and shaped by a searing acidity and an extremely long and citric finish. Clearly a long-distance runner, I would not start drinking it before 2019 but I'd be happy to have enough to enjoy this wine for a decade then.

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**2013 Georg Breuer Rudesheimer Berg
Rottland Riesling Trocken**

The pale yellow 2013 Rudesheimer Berg Rottland Riesling trocken is more fruit intense than the Berg Schlossberg on both the nose and palate but it has the same purity and elegance. Pure and mineral-laced citrus and white peach flavors ally with lovely herbal and floral aromas then lead to a fresh and firmly structured, linear and frisky wine with a searing acidity. Quite closed and piquant at the moment, the excellent length and hidden complexity guarantees great aging potential.

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**2013 Georg Breuer Rudesheimer Berg
Roseneck Riesling Trocken**

Lovely dusty citrus flavors dominate the mineral and floral nose of the citrus colored 2013 Rudesheimer Berg Roseneck Riesling trocken indicating its tremendous complexity and piquancy. Still closed but enormously vivid and piquant on the palate, this is a crisp, pure and multi-layered, medium-bodied wine with nutty and limey flavors, marked acidity and a thrilling mineral and salty finish. This is a great, eternally youthful wine to enjoy in 4 or 5 years for more than a decade.

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**2013 Georg Breuer Rauenthaler Nonnenberg
Riesling Auslese Gold Capsule**

The 2013 Rauenthaler Nonnenberg Riesling comes from the monopole site of Georg Breuer. This citrus colored and flavored Riesling is pure and fresh on the nose but also less ripe than the Rudesheim crus. The palate is crisp, piquant and salty, very pure and almost austere and marked by a searing acidity. This firmly structured wine has nevertheless potential to age for a decade but needs some years to open up.
